Halifax Humane Society exists to protect animals from cruel, neglectful and exploitative treatment. It is the belief of the Society that all living creatures possess an intrinsic value, which is manifested in its creation. Further, the Society believes that mankind must become a responsible steward of animals which he has domesticated and brought under his control.

An Interview with Outgoing CEO



Miguel Abi-hassan has been the CEO of Halifax Humane Society (HHS) since 2011. During his tenure he accomplished many goals and attained numerous milestones for the organization, including the significant accomplishment of achieving a live release rate of 90% or better since January of 2020. A challenging goal for any animal shelter to attain, but even more taunting for an open admission shelter like Halifax Humane Society.

Miguel accepted an offer with an international animal welfare organization in September 2021 and will be leaving HHS as soon as a replacement CEO is secured.

We had the opportunity to sit down with Miguel to discuss his vision for HHS, how he accomplished so much in just ten short years, and his general vision for the animal welfare industry.

SP- I have often referred to you as the Steve Jobs of animal welfare because you genuinely are a visionary and have taken HHS from a shelter with a 40% live release rate (LRR) to an adoption center that qualifies as a no-kill operation with a 95% LRR as of the end of 2020. Simply, how did you do that?

MA- Around 2012, staff and I presented a three-fold strategy to our Board. Our hope was to increase our impact by providing three main pinnacles of holistic animal care. We aptly named it "Plan Alive." The plan included increasing access to resources, increasing our programmatic service offerings, and furthering our outreach. In the span of 5 years, we grew our programs from 16 to 38, including our Foster Program, Summer Camps, a new clinic, and many other improvements. These improvements facilitated a shift in the perception of who Halifax Humane Society is and what our role in improving the status quo would become.

SP- What has been the most challenging part of overseeing the operations of HHS, and what has been the most rewarding accomplishment?

MA- The most rewarding yet challenging accomplishment has to be the drastic increase in our live release rate. Ultimately, when I first came to HHS, we were taking more animals into our doors than my former employer, Atlanta Humane Society. Pet homelessness is not a shelter problem. I often find myself reminding critics that "we don't make them here." Correcting pet homelessness requires the same multifaceted approach to correcting any other social issue; understanding, collaboration, and resources. However, as an organization, we accepted the added challenge of ensuring that we would raise our live release rate without ever closing our doors to an animal in need. It's important to note that restricting intake has often been applied as a

method to increase live release rates, but our organization felt that restrictive red rope policies do not have a place in shelters. Seeing our live release rate of over 90% today, I am glad the consensus was to maintain the core of our open-admission policy, and I'm equally proud of everyone who helped us get there. We did the unthinkable.

SP- Are there any goals or plans you were unable to attain for HHS?

MA- I think the biggest challenge for my successor will be to ensure that we bounce back from this pandemic, not just as an organization but as a community. Many staffing and resource issues have affected social movements, and I'm afraid we may see a slight rebound in the number of animals entering our shelter. I hope that as a community we can all come together and support HHS to ensure whatever rebounds we see in the number of free-roaming animals,we remain supportive of this organization as an anchor of humanity. I remember being in Animal Welfare through the recession, and though we don't foresee history repeating itself, we have to increase our support of non-profits when they're more needed.

SP- You have accepted a position with an international organization. What exactly will you be doing in your new role, and why did you feel it was important to move on from your experience at HHS?

MA- HHS will be held in my heart and memories as one of the best decades of my life. Not many opportunities would entice me to depart from an organization and a second family that I found in my staff and Board. However, this has always been a labor of love that I measure only by the number of animals I can serve today as opposed to

Tails from Vet Services

Our veterinarian staff, led by Veterinary Services Director Dr. Jennifer Green, help thousands of animals each year. Over 7,000 spay/neuter procedures are performed at our Redinger Spay Neuter Clinic each year alone. Animals who need surgical operations are fortunate to arrive at HHS for a chance for a full recovery and then off to a happy and loving forever home.





Here is Picasso.
He entered the shelter in midJune at just over one month in age as a stray through ACO. He had severe facial trauma on presentation, which included a deep laceration that exposed his left maxilla and

his ventral eye. He also had punctures on his left axilla area. He was started on antibiotics and pain medications in preparation for surgery. Dr. Green performed surgery to reconstruct his face and repair the wound on his side.



Two weeks after surgery, he was completely healed save for his left eye still having some swelling. He was placed on additional medications and released for adoption. The two photographs show his initial wounds, the

post-op of the face and flank, and finally once all of the staples and drain were removed. He was adopted in early July.

Sharky, (shown to the left) a 3-year-old male (formally intact)



DSH presented in early August with a deep degloving wound to his dorsal head. Dr. Atwood supervised our visiting veterinary student who performed the initial debridement and repair. Due to the extensive size and infection, Sharky required a second debridement and repair. Dr. Atwood was able to complete the closure.

Below is one of Dr. Atwood's first trauma cases. Big Foot (as he has now been named) is a 3-month-old male, DSH kitten that presented in mid-August with his hind left foot swollen. Once he was sedated, a fishing line was identified to be wrapped and knotted around his foot, thus causing the swell-



ing. He was placed on antibiotics and pain medications. He is recovering currently and hopefully will be up for adoption soon. The two photographs show the patient sedated with the enlarged foot at distance then up close, followed by the fishing line removed, and finally the same foot the next day with the swelling almost completely gone.

The veterinarian staff at HHS, performs hundreds of surgical procedures each and every month. Animals that just 15-years ago may have been required to be euthanized due to lack of available treatment are

now saved and adopted into new loving forever homes.



Our veterinarian staff does not provide services to people for their pets. We work with many private veterinarian practices and suggest pet owners find a local veterinarian who can take care of our pets' needs from annual vaccinations, medications, x-rays, surgeries, and more.

If you need a recommendation for veterinary services, ask another pet owner or a neighbor with a pet who they trust with their pets. Veterinary care is vital to the health and lifespan of your pets.

yesterday. It is seldom that I have the opportunity to impact as many animals as I will in my new role. I will be operating six sanctuaries and coordinating Global Disaster

responses for affected animals. While I still have it in me to run in the direction of a disaster, I want to embrace the challenge of helping animals when the dire need arises at home and abroad.

SP- You have always said that you couldn't ask for a better board of directors. The Board has always been very supportive of your leadership. Can you expand on how crucial it is to have a supportive board?

MA- Ultimately, a CEO's job is to execute and help deliver

on the vision of the Board. Because this Board brings so much business prowess to the table and has so much passion for the mission of our organization, their vision was always evident; to be an anchor of humanity for our community. In the early days, our President Mel Stack once said to me, "Miguel, we are so much more than a shelter." It instills compassion by the way in which we foster care of animals. Our entire Board embraces that concept, and every meeting is dedicated to the notion of proliferating that belief.

SP- Lastly, tell our readers a little about your history prior to joining HHS. How did you get into animal welfare, and what is your general vision for the industry?

MA- I always tell the story that while other children were thinking of becoming astronauts or firefighters, I longed to end up working in an animal shelter. I dedicated my entire educational and professional path to ensure that I could be the best person and leader that I could be. When I finally got my first job at a shelter, I cared for the animals directly and witnessed a lack of leadership. I pursued a Master's in Industrial Psychology so that I could understand social movements and leadership better. Through time I was promoted to several different positions in the Animal Welfare field. Today, I still hold those experiences near and dear. I make every decision in review of what's become twenty-plus years of sheltering experience and ensure the people I hire bring passion and a fervor for the science of animal sheltering into this organization.

Where I see the industry going - Many leaders in this industry say they are trying to put themselves out of a job. I don't ever see a future where there won't be animals that come to our need. Whether it's behavior issues or physical trauma, I

think husbandry is just part of what we do. Another part of what the industry and this organization bring is a reminder of humanity, and I believe this is paramount to our society. During the Capital Campaign for the renovation, we called the build "the anchor of humanity." This is true for this

entire industry. Through animals, we remind people of what it is to be humane.

SP- Is there anything else you would like to say?

Thank you. Thank you for the support, the friendships, the memories, and all the good we did together. A special thanks to our Board, Staff, Volunteers, and Donors. I've learned so much from every single one of you. As I walk out of my

office one last time, it will be you, and all the animals we cared for that will be on my mind. I know there are even more great things to come in the future of HHS.

THE TALE OF TWO ANNUAL RUFF RIDES



It all started with a motorcycle ride through the Ormond Loop in 2011 to raise awareness and money to support our

lifesaving work. Since then, we have transitioned the ride into a poker run and have been fortunate to gain hundreds of riders, and some fabulous event sponsors!

This Biketoberfest we hosted our 22nd Ruff Ride and it did not disappoint! With over 250 riders we made stops in New Smyrna Beach, Ponce Inlet, Daytona Beach, and Ormond Beach. All participants received a limited-edition event t-shirt, a poker hand, dinner, and drink.

October 14th was our second time utilizing this app with incredible feedback from our participants and we look forward to continuing our partnership with moT.



More Success Stories From Vet Services

Frank, a six-year-old male castrated domestic shorthair cat arrived at HHS late on June 3 as an owner surrender. Frank had a long history of suffering from FLUTD (feline lower urinary tract disease). His owner was unable to care for Frank further as he required life-saving emergency surgery, which she was unable to afford. When Frank arrived at HHS, he was unable to urinate for 3 days. As vet's like to jokingly say, emergencies always happen on Fridays. Dr. Green became aware of the case the next day (a Friday). Frank was not doing well clinically. He was lateral, weak, severely dehydrated, and his bloodwork was azotemic (indicates issues with kidneys). Frank was taken to surgery for a cystotomy (to confirm no stones were in the bladder) then he had perineal urethrostomy performed. This procedure removes the external penis and scrotum and creates a permanent opening in the skin for the male, which assists with preventing the patient blocking in the future. Frank recovered over the weekend at Dr. Green's house. He continued to do well, and was adopted by his previous owner later in June. The decision was made to reunite Frank with his family due to the extreme lengths they had already gone with his treatment (his family had already spent almost \$3,500 on his medical care the prior 6 months before surrendering him).



There are a lot of animals that are waiting to find homes. At capacity, Halifax Humane Society can house approximately 400 animals. Our offsite locations, (PetSmart on International Speedway Blvd. and Deland or Pet Supermarket in

Daytona Beach, Port Orange, and Ormond Beach) have a total of 22 kennels. Unfortunately, shelters experi-



ence overcrowding, increasing the need for adoption events to help more pets find forever homes and free up space for more pets in need. We participate in multiple national events throughout the year: Clear the Shelter is held once a year and sponsored by NBC and Telemundo. Empty the shelter sponsored by Bissel is typically held bi-monthly. During these events, our shelter is able to offer discounts on adoption fees. There's been some growing concern that "free adoption" events may




increase animal return rates, but statistics show otherwise. The percentages are the same as if the adopter came in on any typical day at the shelter to adopt, which is around a 25% return rate. Animal shelters are full of amazing, fun, and loving animals waiting for the purrefect home.

While the animals take center stage at pet adoption events, those behind the scenes are very important. Animal lovers get to hang out with pets all day, giving vital information to potential adopters and answering any questions they may have. Volunteers make all the difference at events by keeping the lines moving, keeping pets happy, and sharing the one on one experiences that they have had with the animals at the shelter. Volunteer opportunities at the shelter include walking the dogs, cleaning up kennels, and assisting staff. Some Volunteer opportunities offsite include working adoption events at PetSmart, Pet Supermarket, and Subaru of Daytona. We are all united in helping animals who cannot help themselves, and your support through volunteering is crucial to our organization.





Ask the Animal Trainer

My dog seems to listen okay when we're at home-he'll come running right to me if I call him from another room or if I call him for dinner time. It seems that when we're at the park, he completely forgets how to listen to me; I can call him a million times and he'll totally ignore me, it can get really frustrating and even embarrassing having to yell for him at the dog park. What can I do to get him to listen when we're out of the house?

Dear Yelling,

Establishing a strong recall can be hard in a vey distracting setting (like the dog park!), and your observation of how your dog listens in the home vs. outside at the park is actually quite common among dog owners. A few things to consider when working on your dog's recall should include your tone of voice when calling your dog; do you sound happy and excited to see your dog? Or are you sounding frustrated and upset when calling for your pup to come to you? Your dog will likely not want to come easily if you are yelling angrily... would you happily come to someone angrily yelling at you? Also, do you have anything to offer your dog in return for coming when called? The park is a very exciting and enriching environment, and as dogs owners we must work to make ourselves more exciting than said environment. Try to get into the habit of rewarding your dog with something high-value each time he comes to you, this way he learns that coming when called is truly exciting as it always means you have something good for him. Eventually you can work to phase out treats, but you should still find ways to keep this behavior very rewarding in some other way that your dog enjoys. When working on your dog's recall response, consider starting in a calmer environment such as your own yard before moving on to a more distracting setting like the park.



I just adopted a dog from my local shelter, and his paperwork said he can be destructive inside when left alone. I would like to crate train my new pup to keep him safe while I'm away; I've got the crate all set up but my dog refuses to go in without me picking him up and putting him inside. He doesn't seem to mind being in the crate once I get him in there, but I don't want to feel like I'm forcing him into what should be his safe space. How can I help my dog feel comfortable going into the crate by himself?

Dear Kenneling,

I commend you for choosing crate training to keep your newly adopted dog safe while you're out of the house! I'm also glad to hear that your pup doesn't seem to mind being in the crate once you get him in. When done correctly, crate training can provide a great sense of security to both the dog and the owner

when direct supervision is not an option. It can, however, be incredibly stressful for everyone involved to have to physically force any behavior from our pets- such as going into a crate or other confined space. Instead, try luring your dog into his crate by placing a few treats just outside of the crate's opening. Allow your dog to eat the treats at his own pace, building his confidence in approaching the crate. Gradually move the treats further into the crate, while still allowing your dog to take them at his own pace. Once your dog can comfortably enter the crate on his own to retrieve the treats you've tossed in, you can pair a cue word to the exercise; try tossing the treats in and saying something like "Kennel", or "Load Up". Repeat this process until your dog is comfortable walking all the way into the crate on his own, before closing the door to the crate. By giving your dog the option to go into his crate, you're teaching him that his kennel is a rewarding, safe place for him to be, which will help encourage him to enter the crate more willingly in the future when you leave the house.



I recently got my very first dog, who has been great for the most part with no major behavior issues so far. I would still really like to give her some basic training, and have been learning about positive-reinforcement training which is definitely the right option for us... the only problem is that she does not care about treats at all. She'll sometimes take chicken or string cheese, but not very reliably. I really want to make positive-reinforcement work for us, but it seems almost impossible to find a treat my dog cares about. What can I do to motivate my pup?

Dear Disinterested,

While it may make things a bit easier when a dog in training is very food motivated, it is not a requirement to make positive-reinforcement training work! Reward-based training does not always have to equal treat-based training. A reward in training can be just about anything your dog enjoys- this can include, but is not limited to, physical affection, verbal praise, or play time. An exercise that may be helpful is to make a "Top 10 List" of things your dog enjoys... some examples may include "Having her ball thrown", "Being told *Good Girl*!", "Being invited onto the couch for a cuddle", or "Sniffing the flower patch next to our house". All of the things listed here could be used as a reward during training! Each dog's "Top 10 List" is different, so take the time to consider what your dog may have on hers, and then use her favorite things in lieu of treats during training!
