Over 80% of respondents to a recent survey conducted in partnership with the ASPCA and Adopt-a-Pet indicated that the lack of people-related resources (e.g. fosters, volunteers, staff) negatively impacted their ability to outcome animals in the past year.



GROSS INTAKES VS. COMMUNITY INTAKES

Gross Intakes

Typically used when looking at an individual shelter's data (shelter-level data).

DEFINITION: Total animals entering the shelter. Stray, relinquished by owner, transfers in, other intakes (born in care, seized, etc.).







Community (Net) Intakes

Typically used when aggregating intakes at state/region/national levels to prevent "double-counting" of animals being transferred after initial intake type. Assumes that animals being transferred were already accounted for in another intake type by another organization also in the dataset.

DEFINITION: Total animals entering the shelter **minus transfers in** as an effort to show actual community intakes.








2022 saw a 4.2% increase in community intakes compared to 2021. This increase is being driven by dogs (7.8% increase) while cats only saw a 1.1% increase. Overall, intakes remain 15.5% less than 2019.


Dogs are not being surrendered at higher rates than in previous years. Owner relinquishment rates remained consistent in the last four years at around 25%. Compared to 2021, less than 1% more dogs were surrendered in 2022.

Stray cats are entering shelters at a lower percentage in 2022 than in 2019 (50% vs. 54%). This could be due to trap-neuter-return program efforts.

ADOPTIONS

Adoptions are 3.1% higher than 2021 for dogs and cats. As a percentage of intake, cats saw an increase of 1 percentage point from 2021 while dog adoption rates have stayed steady, meaning that regardless of an increase in intakes, dogs are being adopted at the same rate as 2019 and 2021 in 2022

The percentage of animals entering and leaving through Transfers Out continues to be the lowest it has been in the 4 year period at 11.8%.

The transfer system was disrupted when typical transfer partners, foster-based rescues, increased their intakes from their community during 2020.

There is a higher portion of cats and dogs entering shelters that are not experiencing any outcome in the time period compared to 2021 and 2019.





This chart shows that of all cats and dogs entering shelters for each quarter, these are the percentages that had adoption outcomes.




This chart shows the percentage changes of all dogs and cats adopted each quarter.

Dog adoption rates remain very consistent throughout the year (50%-55%). Overall, cats have higher adoption rates than dogs, but in Q2 their adoption rates decrease and then rebound in Q3 and Q4.



POPULATION BALANCE CALCULATION (PBC)

The SAC Population Balance Calculation (PBC) is the formula we use to determine if a shelter's population is increasing, decreasing, or staying the same. It simply takes the total outcomes divided by the total intakes for a time period.




100% EQUILIBRIUM

100% means that animals are leaving at the exact same rate that they're coming in so the total number of animals is unchanged (equilibrium).




Over 100% means the population is decreasing (i.e. 107% means 7% more animals left than entered the shelter).





Under 100% means the population is increasing (i.e. 97% means 3% of animals that entered stayed in the shelter).




The national PBC for 2022 is 96% which is lower than 2021 (98%) and 2019 (100%).






POPULATION BALANCE CALCULATION (PBC)







Q4: JANUARY-DECEMBER

This report shows comparative data on sheltered animals from January-December 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022. Only organizations that reported complete data for Jan-Dec 2019-2022 are included in the analysis. Most data in the report is comparing Jan-Dec 2019, 2021 and 2022 unless otherwise noted. We intentionally excluded 2020 comparisons for most of the report, unless noted otherwise.



% of organizations in intake/outcome data by region


