

Halifax Humane Society (HHS) Animal Metrics

The following information contains a progress report for HHS intake and outcome animal metrics. Each year data collected is analyzed to identify trends and progress made in efforts to responsibly reduce animal intake and ultimately improve care for animals within Volusia County. In a 7 year period of time, subsidized or free sterilization surgeries have **increased** by **128%** since the opening of the HHS Redinger Spay/Neuter Clinic in 2012. This is the single most important contribution to the overall improvement in intake numbers throughout the community. Listed below, data indicates great strides in the reduction of HHS largest animal intake population: cats. Our goal to find a home for every healthy, adoptable animal in the Greater Daytona region is closer than ever. In fact, our data shows that the Greater Daytona as an entire community is on track to be a no-kill community by 2020, without closing doors, without leaving animals in need to fend for themselves.



HHS Animal Intake is showing a slight **increase** of **2%** in 2018 largely attributed to an **85% increase** of sick Raccoons ("Other" Category) during a rabies alert. Further analysis reflects a yearend total slight increase of **+1.9% in stray cat** intakes and **overall stray intakes are decreased by -0.72%**. Other comparatives show in 2018 a total of **-43% decrease of intake**





HHS Adoptions, Transfers and Return to Owner (RTO) are all in direct correlation to the decrease shown at intake. This means, that less animals coming in will ultimately affect the number available for outcomes. While the raw numbers

may show a decline, in actuality, outcome category percentages compared to intake are showing positive trends overall respectively.



HHS Euthanasia numbers continue to decline bringing HHS closer to achieving its goal of responsibly finding positive outcomes for as many place-able animals as possible. 2018 shows a -19% decrease from 2017 and a -76% decrease from 2012. Through increased program application, HHS has turned the corner from being a shelter that was only reactive to the overwhelming number of animals entering the shelter each year to a proactive approach of addressing the real issues at hand, pet overpopulation.



Aslimor Accords Animal Statistics – Live Release Rates (LRR): The LRR report is reflective of Cat and Dog populations. This report is unique to animal welfare organizations as statistical data takes into account the medical and behavioral condition of animals.
